Vietnam War, U.S. and Japan

The Vietnam war has ended with North-Vietnamese victory. Now unified Vietnam is making progress toward postwar rehabilitation. Once the question, "What is the meaning of the Vietnam War?" was often asked in Japan. But now, there is another question, "What meaning did the war have?" There were many people, American, French and Asian people, who had been concerned with this war, the result of a Vietnam divided into north and south by the Geneva Agreement of 1954. The meaning of the war to all the people involved was obviously dependent on their motives for fighting. The only common point was that the war was a long, heavy and dirty undeclared war for both sides.

So-called Vietnam War was begun during the office of the late President Kennedy. The President's fundamental thought was that Vietnam was a similar case to other Southeast Asian countries, like Laos and so on. He aimed at stopping the guerillas who were supported by communist countries, and letting people choose their future peacefully. But the situation in 1961 was that South-Vietnam was too weak to go on by herself, so if she choose the way of neutrality like Laos, she would be conquered. And during the office of the late President Johnson immediately following Kennedy, in 1964, the incident of Tong-King Bay happened. An American destroyer was attacked by a North-Vietnamese torpedo speed boat. President Johnson ordered the bombing of North-Vietnam in February 1965, and an amphibious assault by the U.S. marines near Da Nang in March 1965. After this, the U.S. reinforced it's troops gradually, and with this, the Vietnam War became a real war. The next President, Richard Nixon, announced the Nixon-Doctrine, and based on this, the U.S. withdrew troops gradually. And in 1973 the U.S. concluded the Paris Peace Treaty, and completed "an honorable withdrawal." This was the final step in the plan of "Vietnamization." The ultimate result of this has been the rout of South-Vietnamese troops and the colapse of the South-Vietnam Government.

It is still not clear what was the real aim of the U.S. in Vietnam, even after the war's over. But there is an understandable fact, and that is, the present U.S. is apparently changed greatly from the nation that embarked on direct intervention in Indo-China. The U.S. emerged victorious from World War II and became the "Guardian of Democracy" against the "creeping communist expansion." It can't be denied she had that feeling, especially as far as contact with Asian countries. But during the Vietnam War, the U.S. was not defeated formally, but in the end, she made no headway against tremendous costs in men and money and withdrew her troops from Vietnam: Moreover, there have emerged many domestic problems in the U.S., economic recession, leading to a severe unemployment problem.

Also the U.S. is presently undergoing a period of severe social introspection and purging. The U.S. has been greatly changed by her experiences in Indo-China. The period of the Vietnam War, it may be said, produced a gradual realization that she could no longer, and showed no longer act as a sole policeman against the spreading influence of communism especially when the policeman himself being policed no longer wished to be.

Japan and we Japanese? At first, it can be said that the relationship between Japan and the Vietnam War was quite strange. The relationship was quite vague and difficult to define through the whole term of this war. Japan does not possess an army, but self-defense forces. It is not allowed to send this self-defense forces to any foreign country under the constitution. Sending troops to a foreign country like Korea is unconstitutional. However, on the other hand, Japan possesses Japan-U.S. Security Treaty. And according to this, for example, the U.S. bombers are not allowed to bomb North-Vietnam directly from Japanese soil. But the U.S. was able to use other bases to carry on these raids and use her bases in Japan as primarily support positions. Also the U.S. tanks and other military equipment were damaged or out of order were sent to Japan for repair. These facts didn't cause any conflict with the Japanese Laws, but political conflict became more prevalent as anti-war movements gradually spread and became active in Japan.

Certainly Japan had no direct involvement but was deeply involved substantially. Now the U.S. forces have been withdrawn from Vietnam and the Vietnam War has ended. In Japan there is no confusion. However, as yet, not certain whether the fog has cleared or not. It can be said that these recent events in Southeast Asia make the turning point in Japanese foreign policy. They also show Japan's inability to develop on worldwide view, and foreign policy.
